MURNEY TOWER'S COLLECTIONS RESEARCH: AN INTERESTING FIND

Murney Tower Museum's one thousand artifacts have many stories to tell – and this summer, Historical Interpreter Alison Dringenberg has been busy digging deeper into the history of our collections. One artifact in particular caught our attention – a small, brown, plastic disc, only 2.6 centimetres in diameter. It was discovered hidden between the pages of our documents – and it turned out to have a long story to tell. This disc was a transportation token from the Kingston Street Railway, Kingston's first-ever, horse-drawn public transit system, inaugurated in 1877. CURATOR & COLLECTIONS

This past 2021 season, Murney Tower Museum hosted our very first virtual event! C&C: Curator and Collections was designed by our manager and curator, Simge Erdogan-O'Connor, as a free event for those interested in the museum's collections. Our third session, which took place on September 16, discussed an 1820s banknote from the Upper Bank of Canada, from our General Collection. Through this segment, we were able to tell a story of the social and economic history of Kingston! Each C&C session had between 35-40 participants who engaged with Simge in fruitful discussions on Kingston's history. We are so grateful to all of those who were able to join us, and we look forward to hosting more events like these in the future!



DOORS OPEN 2021

Our little tower was able to open its doors one last time this season thanks to the Doors Open event that ran in Kingston. Several KAM sites collectively opened their doors for free, pre-registered tour groups on September 25 and 26. Doors Open was a great success for Murney Tower, and we had a total of 144 visitors over the course of the week, all of whom were so enthusiastic to learn about Murney! The event was an amazing opportunity to reconnect with the public before officially closing down for the season - and a positive reminder of the impact our site has on the Kingston community.
