Princess Street Promenade

On 5 August, the Murney Tower Museum participated in the Princess Street Promenade, a special festival that welcomes 100+ businesses and community groups for a day of family fun and discovery. In our booth, we showcased selected artifacts from our collection which offered insights into the 19th century life in Kingston. We also engaged family groups with our special craft activities, which recreated military hats and medals that used to belong to the soldiers who lived in the tower. DOORS OPEN Kingston

On 26 August, we joined a city-wide Doors Open event, which brought together Kingston attractions and museums including the Pumphouse Museum, St. Gorges Cathedral, Military Communications & Electronics Museum, Frontenac Country Schools Museum, Museum of Health Care, the Marine Museum, and the Perth Museum. This special community event allowed visitors to discover, explore, and encounter the spaces, places, and stories that shape the communities of Kingston and the Area. Professional Development Workshop

On 24 August, our Manager and Curator, Simge Erdogan O'Connor facilitated a special professional development workshop offered by the Kingston and Area Association of Museums, Art Galleries and Historic Sites. In her presentation, Simge provided insights into improved accessibility design in museums and revealed how museums, regardless of their size, focus and location, can develop accessibility tools and strategies to create more equal, inclusive, and welcoming spaces.
